Speaker: Fr. Ambrose Criste, O.Praem, Norbertine canon regular from St. Michael's Abbey in Orange County, California. He finished his priestly studies in Rome with pontifical degrees from The Pontifical University of St. Thomas Aquinas (the Angelicum) and the Pontifical Gregorian University. Fr. Criste currently resides at Corpus Christi Priory in Springfield, IL, and is the Director of the Evermode Institute, a new program of catechetical formation.

Themes: Mercy, Forgiveness and Healing

Where is your greatest struggle? In her diary, St. Faustina encounters the Lord in prayer speaking of our earthly struggle and His words resonate for us today. "Fear not, because you are not alone. I am always supporting you, so lean on Me...." As "Pilgrims of Hope" in the Jubilee Year 2025, Pope Francis asks us to discover the unlimited nature of God's mercy, which knows no bounds. In our time on retreat, Fr. Ambrose Criste will bring us to a deeper understanding of the great "vessel of trust" that we have in the Sacrament of Healing (Confession), and how we can experience more of God's abundant gifts of mercy, healing, and forgiveness. It is here you will rest secure in a "hope that does not disappoint." Come join with others from across the dioceses of Atlanta, Savannah, Charleston and Charlotte and enjoy the beautiful surroundings of Heritage. This area is unique in that it encompasses the region where the first Catholic settlers arrived in GA. The abundant trails and prayer gardens on the property provide a unique opportunity to restore, relax, and reset. Our weekend will include Holy Mass Saturday and Sunday, Confession, Eucharistic Adoration, and time for personal prayer and reflection.





Fifth Sunday in Ordinary Time Cycle C

The central theme of today's reading is divine call and human response. Three different types of people Isaiah, Paul and Peter had different spiritual or God experiences in different situations. In the first reading, we are in the Jerusalem temple, a place of high ritual and sacrifice, filled with incense and sacred light. In the temple Isaiah had a powerful vision, he realizes that not only the temple, but all world is filled with God's glory. The earth is filled with His glory. God is not a God of the temple but a God of history, God of kingdoms, God of power. For the next half century, Isaiah is sent to speak God's word to rulers and kings. For the rest of his life, Isaiah will show God at work not just in individual lives but in events of world history. He will speak out not only about personal morality but also about public morality in Israel's national and international affairs. God is present not just in the soul but in world affairs. In the second reading Paul remembers the experience of God that he had different from Isaiah's, on a highway to Damascus. On that dusty road his life changed. He became, of all things, an apostle of Jesus Christ. He experienced forgiveness, redemption, mission and it was all free. There was nothing he had done to deserve it. It was a gift, grace. "By God's grace, I am what I am." Paul would never forget that. And he told the Ephesians, Galatians, Romans, Corinthians, Philippians, everyone he met, about the gift, the grace of redemption. We don't earn it. It is a gift. We can be cleansed and made whole not by our own

effort but only by the grace of Christ's Cross and Resurrection. And it's all a gift, a gift, a gift. This is the truth that St. Paul carried in his life. Peter had a different experience in the miraculous catch of fish. Jesus tells Peter to go out into deep water and catch some fish. Peter did not think much of that because they had been fishing all night and caught nothing. But he did what Jesus said and caught two boatloads of fish. Instead of pulling up an empty net, Peter and Andrew found the net was filled to bursting point, and they had to ask for the help of their partners, Zebedee's sons James and John, to help them bring in the catch. Simon Peter understood the message very quickly. Confronted by the size of the catch, he recognized the presence of God before him

and became convinced of his own sinfulness. Peter saw in that miracle the glory of Jesus. They had "worked hard all night and caught nothing." But at the next moment the boat was so full of fish that they were in danger of sinking. It's a spectacular contrast between emptiness and fullness. As usual, these opposites are not enemies. There is some sense in which we must be empty if we want to receive. What freedom would be ours if we could sit down sometimes with our emptiness (maybe empty feelings, especially) and see it, not as something to be avoided at all costs, but as a purification and a clearing of space for something new to be born. What happened in all these three people is the same. The presence of the Lord emptied them and filled them at once. The process of emptying is the beginning of wisdom and holiness.

We found the same response in all three readings today. Isaiah, seeing the glory of God in his vision, says, "What a wretched state I am in! I am lost, for I am a man of unclean lips... and my eyes have looked at the King, the Lord of hosts." Paul, not particularly known for his modesty, says, "I am the least of the apostles... I hardly deserve the name apostle." Peter begs Jesus to go away --"Leave me Lord. I am a sinful man."—Their confessions mark a turning point in their life and becomes the model for our response to Jesus. They recognized the presence of God near them and became convinced of their sinfulness and weakness. The awareness of one's sinfulness or weakness is one of the many signs of holiness. As people come near to God, they feel they are nothing before the Lord. We see the same response in the above-mentioned three great saints. Paul as he was near to his death wrote to Titus "Jesus Christ came to the world to save sinners. I am the worse among them." God chooses the weak and makes them strong. Paul says, "When I am weak then I am strong." Once Paul thought that he is strong enough to destroy the Christians. His experience with Christ changed him or convinced him that he is weak and powerless before Jesus. Later, God was his strength, Jesus was his power.

February 11th – Feast of Our Lady of Lourdes

Each year, millions of people make their way through the mountainous country of southeastern France to Lourdes. They come seeking cures, hoping to find answers, believing and praying.

She is venerated under this title by the Roman Catholic Church due to her apparitions that occurred in Lourdes, France. The first apparition of 11 February 1858, of which Bernadette Soubirous (age 14) told her

mother that a "Lady" spoke to her in the cave of Massabielle (1.5 kilometers (0.93 mi) from the town) while she was gathering firewood with her sister and a friend.^[1] Similar apparitions of the "Lady" were reported on 18 occasions that year, until the climax revelation in which she introduced herself as: "the Immaculate Conception".^[2] On 18 January 1862, the local Bishop of Tarbes Bertrand-Sévère Laurence endorsed the veneration of the Blessed Virgin Mary in Lourdes.

On 1 February 1876, Pope Pius IX officially granted a decree of canonical coronation to the image as *Notre-Dame du Saint Rosaire*. The coronation was performed by Cardinal Pier Francesco Meglia at the courtyard of what is now part of the Rosary Basilica on 3 July 1876.
